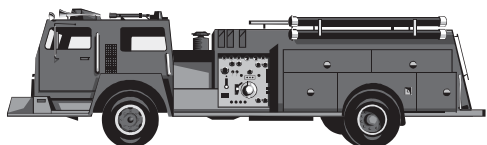

Police Chief Rosch recently introduced two new police officers to the Hartland Village Board. Officer Rob Jewell is from the Fox Valley area and graduated from UW-Milwaukee. The last few years he has worked as a telecommunicator for the Waukesha County Dispatch Center. Officer Brian DeBarge is from the Milwaukee area and is a MATC graduate. He spent four years in the U.S. Marine Corps and most recently was a police officer for the Village of Menomonee Falls.

COMPUTERIZED VEHICLE REGISTRATION-The Hartland Police Department is an authorized agent of the Wisconsin Department of Motor Vehicles to provide vehicle registration and renewal services. To learn about these services, go to www.villageofhartland.com. Once on this website, go to Dept/Services, then Police and click on Computerized Vehicle Registration. Call 262-367-2323 during normal business hours if there are any questions.

COMMUNITY NOTIFICATIONS-The Hartland Police Department is a member of a two nation-wide notification networks, which are basically "Reverse 911" systems. In the event an emergency message needs to be sent out to a targeted area of the community, we would utilize the services of one of these networks. The networks utilized are 1) A Child Is Missing, which is primarily for missing children and at-risk adults, 2) MyStateUSA, which can be utilized for emergency notifications such as evacuations, sex offender notifications, etc.

WINTER PARKING RESTRICTIONS-Winter parking restrictions are in effect from November 1st through March 31st. Parking restrictions prohibits parking on all village streets between the hours of 2:00 AM to 8:00 AM. If you need to park your vehicle overnight on a village street, you will need to call 262-367-0358 Extension 400 after 3:00 PM daily. You will hear a recorded message which will indicate whether you may park on the street during the restricted hours, or because of a snow forecast, no parking will be allowed. Parking citations will be issued to vehicles that park on any village street when the message has denied parking. A tow notice may also be attached to a vehicle and if the vehicle is not removed within the time frame listed on the notice, the vehicle will be towed at the owner's expense.

DRUG COLLECTION-In order to Reduce Substance Abuse, Prevent Childhood Poisonings, and Help Protect Our Environment, citizens can bring their prescription or over the counter medications, sprays, inhalers, ointments, creams, vials, herbals, pet medications and illegal drugs/paraphernalia (No Questions Asked) to the police department 24 hours every day for disposal. Please DO NOT bring hazardous materials/waste (household cleaners, paint, etc) or any items containing or exposed to human bodily fluids.

Remember: No medications should ever be thrown into the toilet-Let us dispose of them properly. If there are any questions, please contact our department at (262) 367-2323

The Village's Recreation Department, for the first time, is hosting the Before and After School Program at Hartland North and South Elementary Schools. The program is held school days Monday through Friday, starting at 6am and the final pick up in the evening is at 6pm. Four well trained staff people manage the program and three weeks into the school year, parents seem to be pleased. "Right now we have about 30 students participating. We are able to offer this program at a very low cost and hope all members of the community are aware of it and are taking advantage of the service," says Director of Recreation, Sasha Snapp. The program offers participants homework time, free play and structured fun! "We have designated times for students to work on any homework they may have or free-reading if they do not have any take home assignments, and essentially we want to send the students home in the evening with work done and ready to be with their families," says Snapp.

FALL LEAF COLLECTION PROGRAM

Monday, October 10 - Wednesday, November 23



The Village-wide leaf collection program begins on October 10th. One collection pass will be made throughout the Village weekly as needed during the collection time.

Please follow these simple rules:

- Rake ONLY leaves out to the street in neat piles or a continuous tight row or rake into the gutter area
- DO NOT BAG LEAVES
- DO NOT place yard waste, brush, garden debris or animal waste at the curb or in with the leaves, it will not be picked up. Animal waste needs to be disposed of in the trash, the other items need to be taken to the Recycling/Yardwaste site located at 701 Progress Drive

ORDINANCE NO. 790-11 (continued)

"An Ordinance Creating Section 78-8 of the Village of Hartland Code of Ordinances Regulating Objects Including Fixtures in the Village Right-of-Way that Obstruct the Right-of-Way"

(f) **No Responsibility for Injury or Damages by Village.** *The Village shall assume no responsibility or liability for injuries or damages that result from fixtures owned or placed by a property owner on or adjacent to a Village right-of-way.*

(g) **Inaction does not Constitute Consent.** *Inaction by the Village to notify the an adjacent property owner ofwhose fixtures exists at the time of enactment of this ordinance at issue shall not constitute consent to place such a fixture, or a waiver from prosecution for any violation under this Code or other applicable laws and under no circumstance shall such a fixture achieve legal non-conforming status.*

(h) **Reservation of Right to Pursue Legal Action.** *The Village reserves the right at any time to take appropriate legal action to ensure that a property owner be held responsible for injuries or damages which result from a fixture owned or placed by a property owner on or adjacent to the Village right-of-way.*

(i) **Inaction by Village does not Preclude Pursuit of Corrective Action.** *Inaction by the Village shall not limit the ability of the Village to prosecute, to the fullest extent, for any injuries, damages or violation of this Code or any other laws which result from a fixture owned or placed by a property owner on or adjacent to a Village right-of-way.*

SECTION 2: *All ordinances or parts of ordinances contravening the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.*

SECTION 3: *If any section, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remainder of such ordinance.*

SECTION 4: *This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and publication.*

REMINDER from the Hartland Water and Sewer Department

The sewer charge on your water and sewer bill is determined by averaging the water consumption used from September 15 - March 15 (January and April water/sewer bills). The figure is derived from the average number of gallons of water used during the winter months. This new average appears on the April bill each year and remains constant for the following three quarters regardless of current water usage. Using this methodology means you are not charged for sewer based on summer months watering uses.

3rd Quarter Water and Sewer Bills are due on October 20th. Bill that are not paid in full by November 1st will be placed on the tax bill with penalty. Prompt payment of the utility bill is appreciated. For your convenience a Drop off collection box is located at the front entrance to the Municipal Building, 210 Cottonwood Avenue.

Fire Hydrants: Please keep the hydrant located near your home free of snow during the winter months. The Hartland Fire Department thanks you!

Street Lights

While you are out in the community taking an early evening walk or driving at night, please note if you see any streetlights that may be out. If they are, there is an easy way to get them repaired. The Village of Hartland pays We Energies a monthly fee to provide the power and maintain our streetlights. WE can be contacted either via the internet at http://www.we-energies.com/night_aura/contact/rptoutage.htm or by calling them at 1-800-242-9137. Please note the location of the pole and the number off of a metal tag on the pole (ex. 03-12345). This helps to quickly identify the light in need of repair. Otherwise, you can contact us at the Village Hall at 367-2714 and we will pass on the information. Thanks for your help in making Hartland shine!



ORDINANCE NO. 790-11

“An Ordinance Creating Section 78-8 of the Village of Hartland Code of Ordinances Regulating Objects Including Fixtures in the Village Right-of-Way that Obstruct the Right-of-Way”

Background: You will recall that we had some issues with regard to some obstacles placed in the right-of-way last year. After researching alternative means of dealing with these items, our attorneys have drafted an ordinance that would create a mechanism to deal with the matter without having to track down every individual potential problem and create an elaborate bureaucracy to keep tabs on them. Please read and become familiar with this ordinance.

The mechanism that has been created puts everyone on notice that property owners would bear at least a share of the responsibility for any damage done in an accident of any kind. Some of that responsibility would be satisfied, if the property owner obtains consent to place items in the right-of-way. The ordinance retains the village's right to order removal of obstructions it feels are dangerous.

STATE OF WISCONSIN, WAUKESHA COUNTY, VILLAGE OF HARTLAND
ORDINANCE NO. 790-11

AN ORDINANCE CREATING SECTION 78-8
OF THE VILLAGE OF HARTLAND CODE OF ORDINANCES
REGULATING OBJECTS INCLUDING FIXTURES IN THE VILLAGE RIGHT-OF-WAY
THAT OBSTRUCT THE RIGHT-OF-WAY

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF HARTLAND DOES ORDAIN AND ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: Article I, of Chapter 78 of the Village of Hartland Code of Ordinances entitled “Streets and Sidewalks” is hereby created to read as follows:

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Section 78-8 – Objects, including Fixtures, in Village Right-of-Way that Obstruct the Right-of-Way

(a) **Purpose.** In addition to section 78-5, to promote the safe use of the Village right-of-way, including, but not limited to, streets, alleys, sidewalks, curbs, shoulders, public grounds or lands dedicated to public use, to the fullest extent by the public and the Village; to reduce the possibility of injury or death, to reduce the possibility of the destruction of or damage to property; to promote the efficient use of taxpayer funds, to ensure the response of emergency services, convenient delivery of mail, safe removal of snow and ice, and maintenance of public infrastructure, and to reduce liability costs resulting from potential collisions or accidents.

(b) **Definitions as used in this Article.**

Fixtures – items attached to land, including, but not limited to mailboxes, supporting poles or posts, ground anchors, signs, light posts, flagpoles, basketball hoops supports, lawn ornaments, statues, monuments, memorials, decorative items, boulders, fences, concrete objects, and bricks, stones or boulders either held together by mortar or other means or arranged in any manner that they cannot easily be moved by a twelve year-old can cause bodily injury or cause damage to any type of vehicle.

Right-of-way – an area of land over which the public and goods have the right to be present, pass or travel. This may include, but is not limited to, streets, alleys, sidewalks, curbs, shoulders, public grounds or lands dedicated to public use.

(c) **Responsibility of Property Owner.** Each *adjacent* property owner shall be responsible for fixtures under his or her ownership and/or control, including, but not limited to, mailboxes and attached materials, supporting poles or posts, ground anchors, signs, light posts, flagpoles, lawn ornaments, statues, monuments, memorials, decorative items, stones or boulders, fences, walkways, and bridges that obstruct or are adjacent to and affect passage through any Village right-of-way, including, but not limited to, streets, alleys, sidewalks, curbs, shoulders and public grounds or lands dedicated to public use.

(d) **Mailboxes.** Mailboxes and attached materials shall be installed and maintained by the adjacent property owner in conformity with Village and U.S. Postal Service policies. This ordinance continues Village policy PPM-1 regarding ice and snow removal.

(e) **No Assumption of Liability by Village.** The Village shall assume no responsibility or liability for any fixture owned or placed by an adjacent property owner that constitutes a road hazard, obstructs or encroaches on the Village right-of-way, or is on or adjacent to the Village right-of-way that affects or interferes with the delivery of government services, maintenance of public infrastructure or impairs, impedes or makes public passage hazardous or potentially interferes with any legally allowable activity on a right-of-way.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK October 9 - 15, 2011

When a smoke alarm sounds we all know what to do, right? Find the nearest escape route, get out and stay out! But if that exit is blocked, the best escape plan in the world will not help you and your family get to safety.

Items that block doors and windows in your home could keep you from escaping in the event of a home fire. Any emergency can affect one's ability to think clearly, but during a fire, smoke and other physical factors can literally inhibit your ability to react. Add a blocked escape route to the equation and your chances of safely escaping a fire may decrease even more. Not only can blocked windows and doors hinder you and your family's ability to escape a fire, but they can also keep firefighters from successfully completing their rescue attempts.



The following tips can help you to increase your chances of escaping your home should a fire occur.

- When arranging furniture and other items, make sure that you're not blocking doors or windows with televisions, heavy dressers, tables, couches, even potted plants.
- Every room needs two ways out, including rooms that have been added in the basement.
- Never nail or paint windows shut. Opening them could be crucial in the event of a house fire. Inspect your windows and doors. Remove nails or paint that could prevent using windows for an escape
- A pile of toys or other items in front of a doorway can block your escape route and could be a threat to the safety of you and your family. Remove toys or clutter that may be blocking doors or windows.

In addition to clearing clutter and unblocking exits, the most important key to your family's safety is planning and practicing a home fire escape plan. Make sure you develop a fire escape plan that identifies two ways out of each room and have a family meeting place outside. Practice using the plan, at least twice a year.

This October 9 - 15 is Fire Prevention Week. What better time to make sure you are prepared in the event of a fire? The Hartland Fire Department is encouraging your family to make a fire escape plan and practice it tonight. For more information visit www.firepreventionweek.org or www.sparky.org.

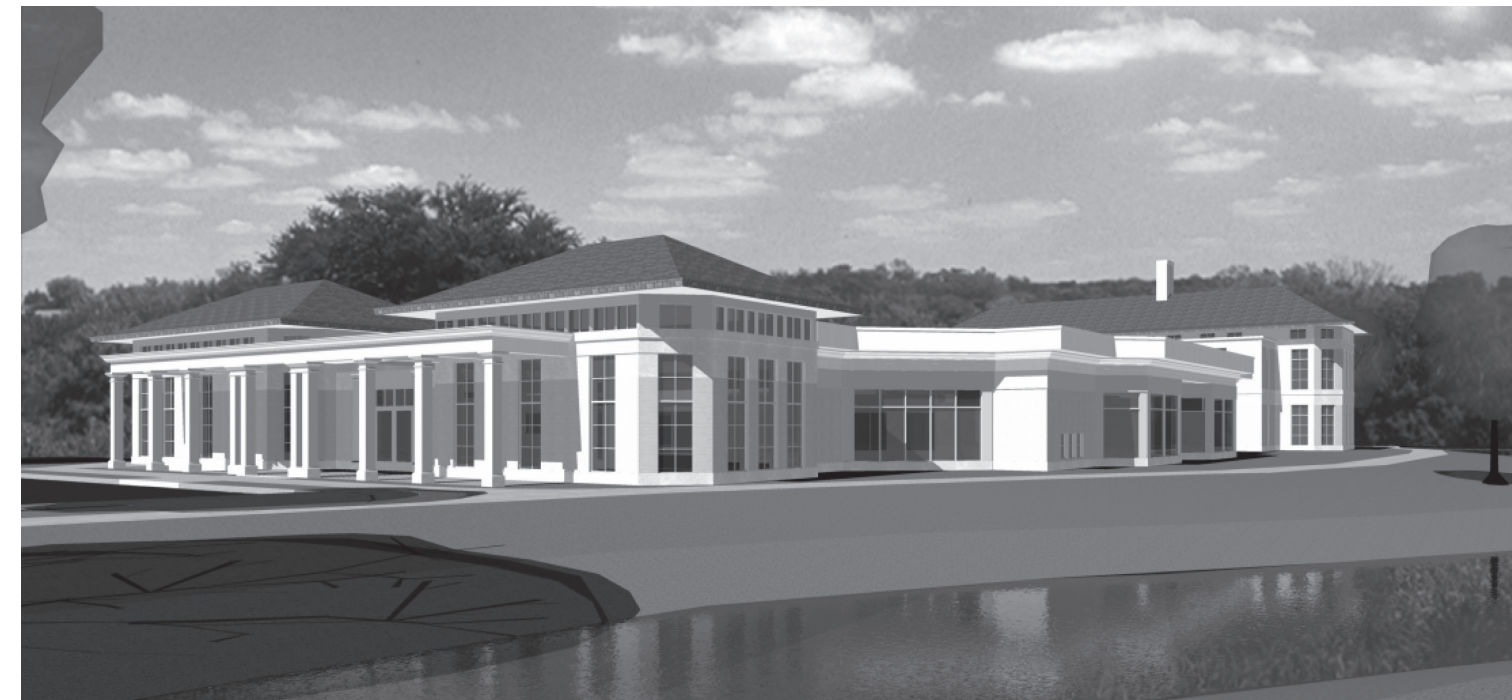
STORIES WITH SANTA
