ARE YOUR READY TO VOTE?

Village of Hartland voters can check election and voter registration information on the Internet before the September Partisan Primary Election to be held on Tuesday, September 9, 2008 by using the State's Voter Public Access website at <http://elections.state.wi.us> under Voter Information.

"It's easy to check whether or not you are registered to vote, and where your polling place is," said Village Clerk Connie Casper. "You simply type in your name and date of birth, or your complete address."

The Voter Public Access site provides three basic types of information:

- Voter registration confirmation
- Polling place information and lists of offices and office holders for whom voters at a particular address can vote
- Provisional ballot status for voters who have cast a provisional ballot

When entering information, voters may occasionally encounter prompts concerning spelling changes or other information that must be double-checked or re-entered, such as the difference between "7th Avenue" and "Seventh Ave." There is an instruction page to help navigate the site.

An electronic sample ballot is available for review on the Village website for the offices and officeholders who will appear on the ballot. This information is available on the Village website at www.village-of-hartland.com – FORMS Tab – under Elections.

Please enter the parking lot using the Circle Drive entrance. You may enter the building using the doors located off of the parking lot and follow the signs to the Borromeo Room. A handicap accessible entrance is also available off of the parking lot.

St. Charles Parish is centrally located and easy to reach for voters in the northern half of the Village. Directions: Merton Avenue south and turn right on Renson Road to Circle Drive or take E. Capitol Drive to Nixon Avenue to Renson Road to Circle Drive. We encourage all voters to use the Circle Drive entryway which eliminates any conflict with the school entrance.

Voter Registration for Wards 8-13 will also take place at this location.

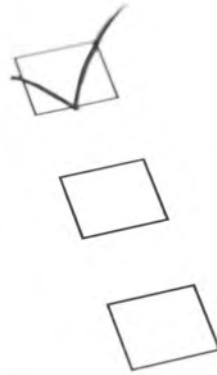
WARDS 1-7 VOTING LOCATION –

VOTER REGISTRATION INFORMATION

If you need to register to vote either because of a move or a name change, you may download the Voter Registration Form located on our website under the FORMS tab, Elections.

First-time voters who registered by mail voters who registered after the close of registration (3rd Wednesday before the election) at the Village Clerk's office, and voters who register on election day all must show proof of residence.

When an elector completes a voter registration application by mail before the close of registration (3rd Wednesday before the election), he or she is sent a first class letter or postcard indicating the correct ward and polling place to the new registrant (s. 6.32 Wis. Stats.). If the letter or postcard is returned or the clerk learns that the registrant has a different address, the registrant is marked as ineligible to vote.

If an elector registers to vote by mail and has never voted in Wisconsin, and does not submit a copy of proof of residence with the application or did not provide proof of residence to the Village Clerk's office before election day, the elector must present proof of residence to the election inspectors at the polling place before being allowed to vote (s. 6.36(2) (c) Wis. Stats.).

First-time voters who need to show proof of residence have the notation "ID required" placed beside their name on the prepared voter list. Note: "ID required" is short for an "Identifying Document establishing proof of residence is required".

Below is a list of acceptable forms of proof of residence which is the same (with one exception) for voters who register on Election Day, voters who register at the Village Clerk's office after the close of registration, and first-time voters who register by mail.

ACCEPTABLE FORMS OF PROOF OF RESIDENCE

Forms of Proof must contain a complete name, including both the first and last name; and a current and complete residential address, including a numbered street address, if any, and the name of a municipality.

Forms which have an expiration date must be valid on Election Day.

- A current and valid Wisconsin driver's license
- A current and valid Wisconsin identification card
- A university, college or technical institute identification card or fee card that contains a photo graph of the cardholder ***May be used even if the card does not contain the cardholder's address, if the educational institution provides a certified student list for use at the polling place.*
- Any other official identification card or license issued by a Wisconsin governmental body
- An identification card issued by an employer in the normal course of business and bearing a photo of the card holder, but not including a business card
- A residential lease which is effective for a period that includes election day (excludes first-time voters registering by mail)
- A real estate tax bill or receipt for the current year or the year preceding the date of the election
- A cable television, gas, electric, telephone or other utility service statement for the period commencing not earlier than 90 days before election day
- A bank statement
- A current paycheck, or check or other document issued by a unit of government

Nixon Pond Dredging Project



The Henry R. Marohl, Inc. company was the successful bidder for the 2008 Nixon Park Dredging and Bank Stabilization program. This project included draining the water out of Nixon Park Pond; dredging the materials out of the pond, and stabilizing the banks along the Bark River at Nixon Park. The work is expected to be completed by early fall. The Village of Hartland received all of the necessary Department of Natural Resources permits to complete this work. All work must be done in accordance with the DNR restrictions regarding fish removal, etc.

The end result should be a pleasant free-flowing waterway through the Nixon Park Pond which we can all enjoy for many years to come.



Congratulations Hartland Sewer Utility

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has recently given the Village of Hartland Sewer Utility Department an "A" Rating for both Financial Management and the Sanitary Collection System in their annual Compliance Maintenance Annual Report (CMAR).

Thanks to the Department of Public Works employees for their diligent work in maintaining and operating the approximate 47.5 miles of sanitary sewer, six lift stations and 1,167 manholes in the community.

BACK TO SCHOOL SAFETY TIPS

Traveling To and From School

SCHOOL STARTS SOON!

**Watch out for kids at intersections or crossing the streets near our schools.
STOP for the school bus when the arm is down – violators will be ticketed.**



SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

Those familiar yellow and black vehicles are the safest form of transportation in the country, considering the many miles and the travel conditions buses undergo to transport children to and from school, sports and other events.

This is due in large part to the many safety features built into school buses. School buses are designed to take a great deal of impact, not to crush in event of roll over, and to cushion children with compartmentalization between the seats in the event of a crash or a fast stop. *Source: Wisconsin Department of Transportation*

DON'T PASS A STOPPED SCHOOL BUS

Drivers must stop on the street or highway 20 feet or more from any school bus that has stopped and is flashing red warning lights. The stop arm on the bus is an added communication to drivers, but the lack of an extended arm is not a reason to pass a bus whose red lights are flashing.

A vehicle owner can be cited when the driver of a car passes a school bus illegally. A law enforcement officer need not witness this violation if the school bus driver reports it to the law enforcement agency within 24 hours. Fines can be quite high for illegally passing a school bus, but the risk of hitting a child is even higher.

CAR SAFETY

- All passengers should wear a seat belt and/or an age- and size-appropriate car safety seat or booster seat.
- Your child should ride in a car safety seat with a harness as long as possible and then ride in a belt-positioning booster seat. Your child is ready for a booster seat when the child has reached the top weight or height allowed for the seat, shoulders are above the top harness slots, or ears have reached the top of the seat.
- Your child should ride in a belt-positioning booster seat until the vehicle's seat belt fits properly (usually when the child reaches about 4' 9" in height and is between 8 to 12 years of age). This means the shoulder belt lies across the middle of the chest and shoulder, not the neck or throat; the lap belt is low and snug across the thighs, not the stomach; and the child is tall enough to sit against the vehicle seat back with her legs bent at the knees and feet hanging down.
- All children under 13 years of age should ride in the rear seat of vehicles. If you must drive more children than can fit in the rear seat (when carpooling, for example), move the front passenger's seat as far back as possible and have the child ride in a booster seat if the seat belts do not fit properly without it.
- Remember that many crashes occur while novice teen drivers are going to and from school. You should limit the number of teen passengers to prevent driver distraction; this is even required by law in many states. Do not allow your teen to drive while eating, drinking, or talking on a cell phone.

BIKE SAFETY

- Always wear a bicycle helmet, no matter how short or long the ride.
- Ride on the right, in the same direction as auto traffic.
- Use appropriate hand signals.
- Respect traffic lights and stop signs.
- Wear bright colored clothing to increase visibility.
- Know the "rules of the road."

WALKING TO SCHOOL

- Make sure your child's walk to a school is a safe route with well-trained adult crossing guards at every intersection.
- Be realistic about your child's pedestrian skills. Because small children are impulsive and less cautious around traffic, carefully consider whether or not your child is ready to walk to school without adult supervision.
- Bright colored clothing will make your child more visible to drivers.

Winter Parking Updates



It is never too early to think about WINTER.....

The Village Board has recently adopted 2 Village Ordinances which change overnight parking and winter parking restrictions for the Village.

Ordinance No. 759-08 Repealed Section 82-4(a) of the Code of Ordinances regarding All-Night Parking. The All night parking restrictions have now been eliminated. However, the winter parking restrictions are still in effect.

Ordinance No. 761-08 Amended Section 82-4(b) of the Code of Ordinances regarding All-Night Parking. Winter parking restrictions have been modified to read as follows with the deletion of text and the addition of underlined text as follows:

Section 82.4. Parking Limitations (b) Winter parking. No person, except while on an emergency call, shall park or permit any vehicle to remain parked on any street or highway in the village between 2:00 a.m. and ~~6:00 a.m.~~ 8:00 a.m. during November through March. Signs giving notice of this restriction shall be placed or erected at or near the village limits on all state and county trunk highways and connecting streets entering the village. Such signs shall be reflectorized and of a type approved by the state highway division as to size of lettering, shape and color. Any vehicle remaining in violation of this section for ~~24~~ 6 hours after removal notice has been posted on said vehicle may be towed and owner responsible for the costs for said towing and storage. Notice of removal shall be in the form of a notice or placard affixed to the vehicle. Costs for towing and storage under this section shall be in addition to any forfeiture imposed by the court upon conviction for violation of this section.

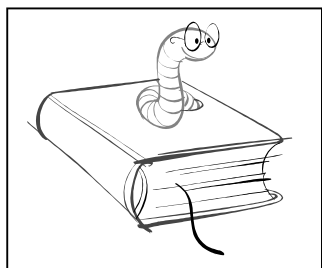
ONLINE REGISTRATION is here!

Toddler Sessions

Your child must be two years old before Storytime begins to be included in the toddler Storytime. Toddler caregivers come in with their children to help them enjoy stories, songs and a simple craft. The sessions run about one-half hours.

Toddler sessions are limited to twelve children.

The preschool sessions are geared for three-to-five years olds. Preschoolers are encouraged to attend Storytime without their caregiver, but you are certainly welcome to come in with a shy or reluctant child until your child becomes used to the routine.
